## INCARCERATION VS. SUPERVISION COSTS

- Approximate cost to house an inmate in a federal prison (**\$27,000/per year**)
- Approximate cost to house an inmate in a community correctional center (**\$24,000/per year**)
- Approximate cost to supervise an offender in the community (**\$3,800/per year**)
- Approximate cost to supervise a defendant prior to being sentenced (**\$2,300/per year**)


# Utah Defendant Offender Work Force Development Task Force (UDOWD)

## Origin

The UDOWD Task Force was established in the fall of 2009. It consists of members from state, federal and local law enforcement and non-profit and religious organizations whose primary goal is to assist ex-offenders obtain employment and learn how to become productive members of society.

## Employee Incentive

Ex-offenders are commonly more motivated than most employees as they feel they have something to prove to themselves, their families and society in general. Being under supervision also mandates they maintain stable employment and undergo counseling and random drug testing, which is commonly an ultimate savings to most employers.

## Hiring Incentives

### Work Opportunity Tax Credit:

Employers can receive up to \$2,400 for each ex-offender they employ. For more information regarding this program go to:
